Synopsis of the Play

A Midsummer Night's Dream is a comedic fantasy in which Shakespeare explores the strange actions of people in love and studies the fine line between dreams and reality. Two famous lines from the play set the tone of action: "Lord, what fools these mortals be!" and "The course of true love never did run smooth."

The action takes place in and around a mythical Athens where the duke Theseus, having conquered the Amazons, proposes marriage to the Amazonian queen, Hippolyta. To celebrate the wedding, six townsmen led by Quince and Bottom, decide to present a play for the wedding feast, and they go into the woods to rehearse.

Theseus's friend, Egeus, comes to the duke complaining that his daughter Hermia refuses to honor her arranged marriage to Demetrius because she is in love with Lysander. The duke tells Hermia to choose one of three fates: marry Demetrius; become a nun; or die. Hermia and Lysander choose to elope instead.

Hermia's friend Helena (who is in love with Demetrius) follows the eloping couple into the woods with Demetrius. The four lovers and the townsmen enter the woods near where Oberon, king of the fairies, and Titania, the fairie queen, are arguing over custody of a mortal baby. Oberon and his mischievous henchman Puck cast spells on some of the other characters. They give Bottom the head of an ass and charm the eyes of Lysander and Titania so that they will fall in love with the first person they see.

The spells create confusion and comedy, but Oberon gets the mortal child he wanted and lifts all spells. Theseus announces a triple wedding for the royal couple and the four lovers, and the mortals all return to Athens, happy but bewildered.

The action concludes with the "merry and tragical, tedious and brief" performance of the townsmen at the wedding feast. After the mortals have all retired to bed, the fairies raise the question, "Was it all real or just another dream?"
