



HISTORY OF THE MID-DELTA ARTS ASSOCIATION

In the summer of 1978 a group of talented individuals put together a musical production called *Fifty Years of Broadway*. Performances were held in the Legion Hut in Indianola, and the response was great. Organizational plans for a community theater in Indianola followed, and in October 1978, Mid-Delta Arts Association was chartered.

During the early years, MDAA offered productions featuring men, women, and children from Indianola as well as the surrounding towns of Inverness, Moorhead, Sunflower, and Greenville. MDAA also brought in several touring company productions which included the Jackson Ballet, the Jackson Symphony, *La Boheme*, John Maxwell's *Oh, Mr. Faulkner, Do You Write?*, and blues artist Son Thomas.

MDAA's first big musical, *The Sound of Music*, was presented in Lockard Elementary School Auditorium. It was a typical hot and humid June. There was no air conditioning, but the crowds came from all over to fill the auditorium for a full week of performances. It was clear that talent in the area was abundant. MDAA Patron Membership grew with each theater season.

MDAA acquired the old Catholic Church building (located on the theater's present site at the corner of Main Street and Sunflower Avenue in Indianola), and work began to transform the old church into a serviceable theater. Although there was little money available, there were plenty of willing volunteers with a strong desire to see the project through. The building was converted with volunteer labor for about \$5,000.

Productions flourished in this setting for the next five seasons. Morris Lewis, Jr., and Farmer H. Hamilton, Jr., co-chaired a Capital Improvement Campaign that resulted in over \$150,000 being raised to completely renovate the theater. At this time, a large lobby area was added, theater seating was installed, a sound and light booth was created, and numerous backstage improvements were made.

We are proud of our most recent renovation to the theater---a new stage with added wing space, backstage improvements, and new curtains as well as work areas. For the past twenty years we have enjoyed one successful season after another. The tremendous support of MDAA Patrons from throughout the Delta has grown steadily. As we look ahead to a bright future, we continue to strive to present quality productions and to encourage the Performing Arts in our area.

GENERAL INFORMATION

The MDAA Requests

LATECOMERS

If you arrive after curtain time, you will be seated by an usher at an appropriate time in the production. We ask your cooperation in fairness to the performers as well as other members of the audience.

The use of **CAMERAS** and other **RECORDING DEVICES** by the audience is strictly prohibited.

Kindly leave **CELLULAR PHONES** and **PAGERS** with an usher. If you are called, an usher will notify you immediately.

SMALL CHILDREN must have their own ticket and occupy their own theater seat. No babes in arms, please.

SMOKING is prohibited in the theater.

REFRESHMENTS are usually served in the lobby during intermission. Please, no food or drinks beyond the lobby.

TICKETS

Our patrons get an opportunity to reserve their seats over a 2 to 3 day period <u>prior</u> to selling tickets to the general public. Our publicity is given mainly through our local newspaper, <u>The Enterprise-Tocsin</u>, with some radio and TV coverage. Tickets are available at the Indianola Chamber of Commerce office, and office hours are Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 12 noon and 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. The telephone number is 887-4454. If for some reason you are unable to attend the performance you have tickets for, please notify the Chamber of Commerce. This will allow us to use these tickets for someone else. Almost all of our performances are sell outs and returning your tickets will prevent empty seats.


